As you will be aware, the deadline has passed for submitting Celebrating Communities grant applications. You will hear from Birmingham City Council about the status of your application in due course.


If the staff appraising the applications think your proposal shows promise but needs strengthening, you may be referred to us for further support. If that is the case, we look forward to working with you soon.


Paid placements on the CREDiBLE project

Care for nature: Severn Trent Community Fund is open for applications

Having partnered with the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games as its official 'Nature and Carbon Neutral Supporter', Severn Trent is refocusing its Community Fund for spring 2022 to support projects that help communities to care for nature.

Non-profit organisations and community groups with an average annual income of less than £500,000 (over the last three years) are invited to apply for grants of £5,000, £10,000 or £20,000 to support new community projects linked to one or more of the following themes:

- Recycling and making the most of resources
- Water saving heroes.
